* PROFESSIONAL ORGANIZATIONS/WRITERS GROUPS (\$\$-\$\$\$)

SCBWI (The Society of Children's Book Writers & Illustrators) - my #1 recommendation of organizations to join for children's writers. Membership in this global writer/illustrator organization entitles you to attend free and discounted events (non-members can attend events for a higher fee); to apply for scholarships, grants, and book awards; and to access free online resources, including regional blogs.

Critique Groups – Read <u>here</u>, <u>here</u>, <u>here</u>, and <u>here</u> for a series of posts about the benefits and ins and outs of critique groups. You can find critique groups through professional organizations, social media groups, even your local library. Reach out to your local SCBWI chapter or librarian for help!

<u>12x12 Picture Book Challenge</u> (virtual; challenge to write one picture book manuscript per month in a year; membership includes private forum, private Facebook group, monthly webinars, book talks, submission opportunities)

<u>Children's Book Insider</u> ("CBI" - virtual; membership includes monthly newsletter, abovethe-slush pile submission opportunities, occasional webinars/ask-me-anything sessions) <u>Inked Voices</u> (virtual; platform for workshops/webinars, critique events, and for writers to find critique groups)

<u>Courage to Create</u>/<u>Write Submit Support</u> (virtual; offered through The Writing Barn; CTC is a support community with coaching sessions, webinars, faculty panels, craft and industry workshops; WSS is a long-term course with writing exercises, presentations, networking, goal setting, private Facebook group)

* **CONFERENCES** (\$ - \$\$\$\$) <u>SCBWI</u> (virtual & in person) <u>Picture Book Summit</u> (virtual) <u>Write On Con</u> (virtual) <u>Rutgers One-on-One</u> (in-person; must apply to be accepted)

*CRITIQUE/EDITING SERVICES (\$-\$\$\$)

You can pay for professional critiques and editing services from published authors, editors, and agents, either offered. Sometimes this is an optional purchase as part of a conference or workshop, as part of an online course, or offered privately.
